# TORONTO BIENNIAL OF ART ANNOUNCES FREE PUBLIC PROGRAMS FOR ITS THIRD EDITION OPENING SEPTEMBER 21, 2024

# Gatherings, performances, workshops, movement sessions, artist talks, and Storytelling sessions among featured programs

Toronto, Canada (July 23) — The Toronto Biennial of Art (the Biennial/TBA) has announced an expansive selection of free arts events and learning programs for its third edition, taking place from September 21 to December 1, 2024. Created for participants of all ages, TBA programs include performances, spaces for exchanges and conversations, hands-on workshops, and learning experiences. Connected to this year's Biennial exhibition, titled *Precarious Joys,* programs are led by and will feature local, national, and international artists and collaborators.

"I am inspired by the generosity and depth of thought reflected in our public and learning programs this year," said Ilana Shamoon, Deputy Director & Director of Programs. "Working closely with artists and partners, TBA offers intergenerational visitors, as well as school and community groups, moments of relation and reflection. These programs invite visitors to consider artists' unique perspectives on our turbulent and complex times while also acknowledging joy, connection, and vulnerability. Through projects ranging from collective singing and poetry readings, to family-centred weekend art-making activities, to lively artist talks, TBA's programs animate its venues across the city throughout the Biennial's 10 weeks."

### **Public Programs and Learning**

With a focus on performance and movement, 2024 Biennial programs branch out from the exhibition to address the inherent wisdom and knowledge we all carry within us, as we collectively contemplate, sense, and experience the body as a container of time and attention.

As part of these programs, a performance series will see artists investigate the body as a living archive, exploring its extraordinary strength and resilience, as well as its tenderness, fragility, and limitations. A related workshop series will centre embodied learning by inviting audiences of all abilities to consider time, space, and movement through somatic learning and unlearning.

In parallel, learning programs offer educators and learners of all ages a meaningful collection of six newly commissioned resources, known as Mobile Arts Curriculum tools, co-created with programs and exhibitions artists. Also new this year, TBA's school programs will be led by R.I.S.E. (Reaching Intelligent Souls Everywhere) Edutainment Storytellers who will engage with students through facilitated sessions and workshops that incorporate their artistic practices including spoken word, poetry, and movement. Finally, TBA's beloved Storytelling Program returns for all audiences, led by a new roster of artists who combine conventional interpretation with narrative responses to the artworks.

Critically acclaimed director, playwright, and scholar Jaye Austin Williams will stage an excerpt of the forthcoming live stage adaptation of "A Map to the Door of No Return" by renowned Toronto-based poet Dionne Brand. Held within 2024 Biennial artist Charles Campbell's installation, this program is presented as a "concert recitation": an intimate performance and rendition that will showcase a dramatized reading with three actors, adapted and directed by Williams with excerpts from Brand's book.

# MOSSBELLY

Performance Angela Vitovec Dates: October 17, 20, 22 | Time: To Be Announced | Location: Music Gallery

*MOSSBELLY* is an intergenerational performance and choreographic meditation on our human connection to land, plant life, nature, and time. Through the lens and in the spirit of the moss plant, dancers move, share, connect, and support each other as moss supports the ecosystems of a forest. This choreography of rhythms embraces us and develops a new and entirely sensual poetry of bodies and their presence.

### Words echo and gather strength

Workshops

C Magazine with Aisha Sasha John, Ivetta Sunyoung Kang and Kii Kang, and Pardis Pahlavanlu Dates: November 8, 15, 22 | Time: To Be Announced | Location: 32 Lisgar Street

In this series of artist-led workshops, language and ideas lift "off the page" and consider how the voice is aligned with the body, ever expanding into the broader world and its interactions. Participants will work with artist facilitators to develop approaches to expressions of voice in multiple mediums (poetry, zine-making, and more) that explore the influence of language, media, and art on how stories and knowledge are acted upon, shaped, and recorded.

### **One Hundred More**

Performance Justine Chambers and Laurie Young Dates: November 28 and 29 | Time: 8pm | Location: The Theatre Centre

*One Hundred More* is urgently informed by our current socio-political climate which has produced an ever-greater groundswell of bodies resisting, moving in collective anger, revolt, and counter-resistance, captured and replayed in an endless torrent of images. In response to the "hands up, don't shoot" gesture, the work is an incremental choreography of personal physical strategies the artists deploy as women of colour and mothers. Set to a pulsating score, this performance is a physical declaration of resistance and friendship.

# Love Songs to End Colonization

*Love Songs to End Colonization* is a karaoke project founded on joy, futurity, and collective voice that repurposes popular love songs to critique and confront settler colonialism. Listeners are invited to perform a song, sing along, clap, dance, or simply witness and soak in love and music to dismantle colonialism, one love song at a time.

(158 Sterling Road, 9th floor) Each week, join TBA Storytellers at 32 Lisgar and The Auto Building for drop-in Storytelling sessions. Storytellers are practising artists and educators who will lead the public through conversational and participatory tours. ### **Public Programs Hubs and Sites**

Most public and learning programs will be held in person at the Biennial's central exhibition and programs hub at 32 Lisgar Street, in the heart of the vibrant West Queen Street neighbourhood. In addition to weekly Storytelling sessions, school visits, and regular programming, this space will be home to local artist-run publisher Art Metropole's pop-up shop.

Other active programming sites include TBA's exhibition locations at the Auto BLDG. (158 Sterling Road, 9th Floor), the Art Gallery of Ontario, Collision Gallery, Gallery TPW, The Power Plant Contemporary Art Gallery, and Toronto Sculpture Garden, as well as partner sites including Colborne Lodge at High Park, Hart House, The Theatre Centre, The Music Gallery and the Toronto Public Library - North York Central.
